### Whaddon Parish Council Chairman's Report

A former Prime Minister once said, "A week is a long time in politics". That is true, I think, in all aspects of our lives and none more so than in the last quarter. I was writing happily in my column last August of hot sunny days, of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations in Whaddon and I mentioned the sporting success of some of our national teams. Now, sadly, three months on, the outlook is not nearly as happy in so many of our national affairs. We have not only seen the death of our Queen, but we are also facing inflation and recession with no easy solution to our economic problems in sight.

Buckinghamshire Council, where I represent you, will have budget difficulties to resolve for some years ahead. We most certainly must be prudent in our council tax calculations for the County, but at the same time maintain our standards on social services, road repairs and all the other services that we provide.

The Parish Council met recently to fix its precept (the money that we ask Buckinghamshire Council to provide) at an unchanged level. We believe we can maintain our services to the usual standard.

We are studying the progress of the County's plan to build more than a thousand houses on the Milton Keynes edge of Whaddon Parish, known as Shenley Park. A planning document giving greater details will be published in January. Traffic movement will be one of the biggest issues and we are liaising closely with Whaddon School on the implications for education.

By the time that the Parish Council meets again in January, I hope that everyone will have had a good Christmas and New Year, despite the uncertainties facing us all.

### **SHENLEY PARK - PUBLIC CONSULTATION**

### \*\*WHAT WHADDON RESIDENTS NEED TO KNOW\*\*

If you have read recent Whaddon Quarterlies, you will know that **at least 1150 homes** are planned along Shenley Road, just beyond Briary View at a site named Shenley Park (see front cover aerial photo). This figure could **increase to up to 1650** homes, depending upon the planning application that the developer, Crest Homes, submits - probably during next year. Buckinghamshire Council (BC) are hoping to have these new homes built and occupied by 2033. Looking even further ahead, this figure might possibly increase closer to **2000 homes or more**, depending on the number of extra homes needed in Buckinghamshire and if, during the review of the replacement VALP to 2040, BC considers that extending this site up to the woodland east of Coddimoor Lane is a sustainable option.

Key land uses within the site also include a 110-bed care home or extra care facility, a new primary school and nursery, possibly a site for a secondary school if needed, a mixed-use local centre including a community hall, a contribution towards a health care facility, multifunctional green infrastructure, and a new link road from the A421 to H6 Childs Way and/or H7 Chaffron Way.

The Whaddon parish population will *increase almost tenfold* from some 400 now to around 3500 probably before 2033 - just ten years from now - with the first 50 homes expected to be completed by 2025. These new residents will pay their council tax to Bucks Council and not Milton Keynes.

### **PUBLIC CONSULTATION - EARLY JANUARY**

A Supplementary Planning Document (SPD) is currently being finalised by BC and they inform us that this will go out for a 6-week public consultation, very early in the New Year. At this time, we have no clear idea of what this crucial consultation will contain, or what questions may be asked. But most certainly BC will present a draft 'land use plan,' together with various options for consideration on traffic, landscape and general development parameters. It will be on these documents and plans that residents' views will be sought **BEFORE** it is finalised and adopted as planning quidance.

This document is required by BC as a guide to development and should be in place before Crest Homes can make a planning application. WPC has had some limited involvement in this process and has prepared a village 'wish list' on possible traffic, highway and landscape improvements, **but there is so much more to consider!** 

## THE SPD IS HUGELY IMPORTANT TO EVERY RESIDENT BOTH NOW AND IN THE FUTURE.

**Everyone** should be thinking about how Whaddon village can or will integrate with what is essentially a new suburb of MK, but in doing so, they should **remember** that **all of the 'at least 1150 homes'** will be within Buckinghamshire and more particularly **within Whaddon Parish** itself.

No one can predict with any certainty, but you must assume that not all residents within this new supposedly sustainable development will automatically align

themselves and their families towards MK and some, possibly many, might prefer to be welcomed as part of a village community, and those that do, might enjoy joining in with Whaddon Village activities.

### WHAT WILL NEW SHENLEY PARK RESIDENTS DO?

Will they attend functions within Whaddon Jubilee Hall, which will be within easy walking and cycling distance, and within their parish? Presumably they will be invited to do so, as they move in and the population grows, and maybe some will look to make Village Hall bookings, for parties or other events. Or will new (or indeed existing) residents congregate towards the proposed new community hall, which might get built, but probably at a later stage in the development process, if at all?

Will the mixed-use local centre contain a new Pub, and even if it does, will the new residents prefer the ambience of the historic local hostelry: the Lowndes Arms?

The same goes for our Village Church and Chapel, as the VALP policy makes no proposals for places of worship within the new development area. It would be wonderful if the Church, for instance, had an even larger congregation. But remember the Church has no water supply or toilet facilities, so can it cope?

I do not know enough about education, so I am hesitant to speculate on the future of our village school, but surely the future looks good? And what about the future and the councillor composition of your Parish Council? There is an awful lot to consider, and now is the time to do so!

### THE MAIN ISSUE .... AND REASONS.

Every major development must provide or contribute to the basic services that a new sustainable community will require, such as roads, drainage, education, social and affordable housing, public open space, play areas etc, all paid for out of the dramatic increase in land value that the grant of planning permission brings.

Additionally, and if as a direct consequence of the development, it can be demonstrated that such growth impacts negatively on nearby communities causing problems to existing facilities and infrastructure, it may - repeat 'may' - also be possible (by agreement between BC and the developer), to provide capital funds (but not ongoing running costs) towards general community and leisure facilities. Such negotiated funding can be used for the provision, extension, adaptation or enhancement of local facilities and infrastructure thereby helping to cope with the additional pressure that the development might cause.

This type of funding, commonly known as a 'Section 106' agreement, is drafted when it is considered that a development will have **significant** impacts on the local area that cannot be moderated by means of conditions attached to a planning decision.

For example, a new residential development can place extra pressure on the social, physical and economic infrastructure which already exists in a certain area. A Planning obligation will aim to balance the pressure created by the new development with improvements to the surrounding area ensuring that where possible, the development would make a positive contribution to the local area and community.

This type of funding is often associated with local 'off site' highway improvements because new development can have huge traffic implications, and whilst BC will try and negate such concerns, they must also be made aware of other community concerns and requirements, especially when such large development proposals are planned so close to existing communities and are certain to impact on them.

### WHAT CAN RESIDENTS DO?

# THERE IS A VERY SIMPLE RULE - IF RESIDENTS DON'T MAKE THE CASE, IT IS UNLIKELY TO BE CONSIDERED BY BC - AND THE DEVELOPERS ARE UNLIKELY TO OFFER - BECAUSE IT WILL DIMINISH THEIR PROFITS!

Therefore, when the Public Consultation takes place in January, residents should carefully consider what the impending growth will mean for Whaddon, and indeed themselves, and what might be needed to negate any problems caused by development - which is likely over the next 2 - 20 years. There is bound to be a large increase in traffic, footfall and events arising as a direct consequence of some 3500 new 'Whaddon' Parish Residents who will be within easy walking/cycling distance of Whaddon facilities, including the Village Hall, Public House, Church, Chapel and playing field.

# THE JANUARY PUBLIC CONSULTATION WILL BE THE <u>LAST CHANCE</u> TO MAKE YOUR VIEWS KNOWN, BEFORE THE DOCUMENT IS ADOPTED AS PLANNING GUIDANCE.

Your <u>only</u> chance to comment thereafter, will be at the actual planning application stage (likely during next year) **but to influence change at that late stage, may be very difficult indeed if not impossible, because any planning application submitted by Crest Homes should be based upon the already adopted SPD!** 

### When commenting, remember the Assessment criteria:

The purpose of a S106 agreement is to mitigate the impact of the development on the local community and infrastructure, but:

- It must be necessary and caused directly by the development.
- It must be relevant and required to mitigate the impact of the development.
- It must be reasonable, in scale and kind, and any other legal criteria by BC.

## To be eligible for Section 106 funding, the applicant/organisation must have: -

- A constitution or set of rules,
- Demonstrate that they have consulted the facility users and/or the local community.
- Provide any other evidence of need for the project,
- Have the written support of the local Parish Council.

### **Cheaper Heating Oil, anyone...?**

You may not know it, but there's a buying syndicate for heating oil based in Whaddon and for nearby villages.

Operated on a not-for-profit basis, it is entirely free to join and can result in a saving of 4 - 5 pence per litre. Each month, members decide if they'd like to add to a group order (500 litres minimum), and if they do, they email the person who runs the syndicate. The price for a bulk order is negotiated and the order is placed by the syndicate organiser. You then pay the oil company direct at the agreed price and your oil is delivered, usually within 10 days.

### A message to Whaddon from Olga

One more day, one more night... What's been happening today in Ukraine? I need to message my brother and friends to make sure they are ok... now I can sleep, tomorrow is a new day...

I wake up early, my son sleeps deeply. I make my morning coffee and open the door to the outside... yes, we are in Whaddon. It will be sunrise soon; I can hear birds' song, feel the wind blowing and the smell of the trees.

I try to enjoy this moment and keep looking around. My brain is unable to stop thinking... how could all this have happened? I'd never planned to visit the UK; I've never thought to live outside of Ukraine...but here we are in Whaddon. Whaddon... a small but beautiful village, we've already met people with big, kind hearts.

I believe when our life is active and we are kept busy, we often have no time to stop and think. But I feel it's important to keep positive, build new plans for our future and to find the energy to keep going.

### **Clocks Went Back on 30th October**

With the clocks having gone back on 30 October, our homes will be in darkness in the late afternoon – a gift for opportunist burglars. Unfortunately, burglars see the longer winter nights as an opportunity to increase their criminal activities, so to avoid becoming a victim of burglary, Neighbourhood Watch are encouraging all residents to look at their home security and take some simple, yet effective steps to protect their homes:

- 1. Use a timer switch to turn on lights and a radio (not too loud to annoy neighbours!) to give the impression someone is home.
- 2. If you are away overnight or longer, ask a neighbour to park their car on your drive to create the appearance of your home being occupied.
- 3. Fit sensor lights to the outside of your property to light up any unwanted visitors.
- 4. Keep valuables and other electronic equipment such as laptops out of sight, and security mark valuables with a UV pen and register them with 'Immobilise', (a scheme which helps Police identify the owners of recovered property thousands of times every day).
- 5. Double-lock UPVC doors or use dead locks on solid doors.
- 6. Keep all spare keys, including car keys, away from the front door and out of sight to avoid them being 'fished' through the letterbox.
- 7. Keep windows locked with the key and keep it out of sight.
- 8. Don't leave the packaging boxes from expensive new TVs or game consoles outside by your bin, this will just act as advertising what goodies you have inside your home.

### **NUMBER PLATE THEFTS** (Hot off the Thames Valley Police press)

There have been increased reports of Number Plate Thefts in the Aylesbury Vale Local Policing Area recently.

The easiest way to change the identity of a stolen vehicle or avoid speeding tickets and parking tickets is to fit stolen number plates. Using security screws to attach your vehicle's number plates makes it harder for thieves to get your number.

### SCAMS.

Be on the lookout for these scams and remember, if you, or someone you know, has been a victim, find out how to report it.

<u>Friend in Need:</u> A 'friend in need' scam is targeting WhatsApp users. Criminals are posing as friends or family members in need of help. They will text from what they claim to be a new mobile after their old one was 'lost/damaged.' They will then go on to ask for money to pay an urgent bill/new phone. Recent scams have even initially asked for funds to be transferred to a friend or family member before being sent on to the scammer to give the appearance of an initial low risk payment.

**Energy Price Cap**: With the severe increase in the energy price cap reported, fraudsters are likely to seize this opportunity to exploit those looking to change energy provides and/or tariffs. Individuals are being warned to be vigilant to avoid falling victim to new campaigns associated with energy supplies, for example: offers which seem too good to be true or fake rebates.

<u>Cost of Living Crisis:</u> With the cost-of-living crisis deepening scammers will be using the economic downturn to their own benefit. The warning comes as many are receiving a first instalment of a cost-of-living payment, worth £326. Reports have been received by Action Fraud of fraudsters attempting to exploit vulnerable people with the promise of money saving schemes, including, energy and council tax rebates or phishing exercises encouraging individuals to apply/ claim a 'cost of living payment' via text, followed by an email to gain further information from the victim.

<u>Fake Santander Email:</u> Lots of people online have been flagging a fake Santander mobile banking email. The email impersonates Santander's branding and gives you a sense of urgency regarding your access to banking services, to pressure you into giving away data. Over recent weeks, use of the search term Santander email scams has increased by more than 5000%, showing the spike in people being targeted with this new scam. Know what to look out for.

<u>British Gas Fake Email</u>: Scammers are impersonating British Gas with fake emails tempting recipients to click a link to get a fake energy refund. Although the email looks legitimate, it addresses you by your email address and not your name. This is a potential giveaway that it's from a fraudster.

<u>Premium Rate Number Scams</u>: This scam tries to trick people who are searching online for telephone numbers of government advice services. It works by displaying an advert for the phone number of the relevant government advice line. But the sting is, that you'll be charged a premium for using this advertised telephone number – in some cases, as much as £20 or £30 a call. You are put through to the right advice line, but you pay a very high and unnecessary connection fee. Find out which phone numbers to look out for.



### Whaddon reverberates to harvest bale carting

It's harvest time again. And that means bale carting, as the residents of Whaddon are only too fully aware.

ONCE again, fields beyond Whaddon have yielded their harvest of grain.

And, in the far distance down Kennel Lane and beyond. ricks have grown higher and higher as one bale is mounted carefully upon another (right), almost taking on the stature of an ancient citadel or an Egyptian sphynx! Long gone are the days of stooks, pitchforks and horse-drawn wagons as today, one bale alone, even though lighter than some wheat straw bales, can weigh in excess of 65kg – well out of the capability of one man, or even two. So, it's hardly surprising in this highly mechanized age that forklift trucks have a vital role to play.





These trucks come into their own again when the time comes (left) to transport them to another place for longer term storage – in Whaddon's case to Bottle Dump Farm where passers-by can see the bales stacked high, dwarfing nearby New Bare Farm and New Bare Farm Cottage.

Four-wheel tractors and long, flatbed trailers **(right)** undertake ferrying duties from the fields – typically a flatbed can accommodate as many as two dozen bales, though sometimes only 16 are required for a particular stacking situation.

If past practice is anything to go by, wheat grain from fields adjoining

### How to save some money on your energy bills this winter

The prospect of huge home energy bills this winter, means we are much more conscious of our energy usage. Here are some tips and ideas that could help keep a lid on costs.

### Turn down the thermostat by one degree

If you turn down your main thermostat just one degree it will cut your heating bills straight away, and you may not feel any difference. Experts suggest waiting for a day and seeing how it feels. If you're still feeling OK, turn it down another degree. Most families are happy with a setting somewhere between 18C and 21C, but it may need to be warmer if there are elderly or infirm people living in the property. The Simple Energy Advice website says a one-degree reduction can slash your heating bill by 10%.



### Heat the human, not the home

When the energy companies advised customers to cuddle their pets it rightly caused a furore but there are obvious steps you can take to keep warm, such as wearing a thicker jumper or investing in a cosy layer. The shops are full of this type of clothing, including onesies and hooded blankets, at the moment with prices to suit every budget. If you are working from home the extra layer may help you stick to your conviction about the thermostat temperature.

### Winter-proof your home

There's no point cranking up the heating if that warm air is escaping up the chimney or under the door and there are cheap fixes for this. You can make your own draught-excluders for internal doors using rolled-up towels, or tights filled with old clothes. If there's a chimney you're not using, stop the hole with an inflatable chimney balloon, which cost about £20. The Energy Saving Trust (EST) estimates that installing a chimney draught-excluder can knock about £65 a year off your energy bills.

### **Insulate your loft**

According to the EST, an insulated loft can save up to £355 a year on energy bills in a semi-detached house, rising to £590 for a detached house. If your loft is easily accessible, you can do the work yourself using rolls of mineral wool that rest between the joists. There are videos online that show how to fit this. It costs about £630 to insulate a loft in a detached house, according to the EST, £480 for a semi, and £455 for a terrace house, so this is an investment that pays for itself over several years.

### Change how you do chores such as laundry

Washing clothes at higher temperatures uses more energy, so savings can be made when you turn down the dial. The EST says that washing at 30C, rather than 40C or higher, will save 40% of the energy used every year. Make sure you optimise your machine by only doing full loads. A tumble dryer will run up more costs, so try to air-dry on a clothes horse or heated airer. If you do have to use the tumble dryer, spin clothes at the highest cycle in the washing machine before putting them in.

### Turn off the heating in unused rooms

Many households will delay switching on their radiators for as long as possible. However, once the heating goes on, if you are savvy about the rooms you use (and use the radiator valves to turn the heating off) you can have it on, but still cut your energy usage. Also, ensure sofas or beds aren't in front of radiators, as that prevents the warm air from circulating. Whatever you do, don't forget to bleed radiators: ensuring there's no air trapped inside will keep your central heating system running efficiently. You can find guides on how to bleed your radiators on YouTube.

### Avoid standby, unplug gadgets and turn lights off

Unplugging devices at the mains will make sure they are not adding to your bill unnecessarily. Some gadgets are often left on all the time, barely noticed by the householder, such as computers, media servers, set-top boxes, heated towel rails and underfloor heating – collectively known as the "phantom load". It won't recoup a fortune, but a simple step is to turn lights off when you leave a room.

### Make changes in the kitchen

Recent research by the energy supplier Utilita suggested households could save hundreds of pounds a year by opting for more efficient cooking methods. "Microwaves, slow cookers and air fryers all tend to be cheaper ways of cooking meals than using an oven," according to Uswitch's energy expert, Ben Gallizzi. Other tweaks include batch cooking, using the right-sized pan with a lid, simmering rather than boiling, and avoiding overfilling the kettle. The study found that a microwave was the cheapest cooking option.

### Take showers not baths and install a water-efficient shower head

A five-minute shower uses about a third of the water of a bath. Obviously, the less water you use, the less energy you need to heat the hot water, and the lower your energy bills will be. Heating water is responsible for about 20% of household gas consumption and "low flow" shower heads can cut water use by about 40%.

### **Current local planning applications.**

### 22/02698/APP - Proposed detached dwelling - 8 Stock Lane, Whaddon.

Following pre-application discussion with Bucks Council, initially for a more traditional two storey house, (which BC advised they were unlikely to support), the agents and architect for the applicant submitted a detailed planning application for a contemporary dwelling which incorporates significant design and other changes, aimed at overcoming BC's concerns. The application impacts on the adjoining village school, the character of Stock Lane and street scene, and has traffic concerns, although BC highways do not appear to have any objections subject to certain conditions. After careful consideration at the 8th Sept. parish meeting WPC submitted an 'Objection' response, which generally supports that submitted by the BC Heritage Department.

This application was WITHDRAWN on 24th Oct, with NO DECISION having been made by BC.

## <u>22/02818/APP - Householder application for proposed conservatory - The Old Vicarage, Church Lane, Whaddon.</u>

Householder Consent GRANTED on November 1st.

## <u>22/00221/APP - Temporary siting of childcare nursery, enclosed outdoor play space and associated infrastructure - Thrift Farm,</u>

# 21/04926/APP - Demolition of existing greenhouses. Erection of a childcare nursery, enclosed outdoor play space, landscaping and associated infrastructure. - Thrift Farm, Bletchley Road, Whaddon.

Following the BC planning dept's confirmation to Highways that permitted development rights do not apply to this site, the highways dept. amended their reply to one of objection, but the planning dept. may override this advice. WPC has received confirmation that the adult care provision historically undertaken at the site will be safeguarded, and although some highway concerns remain (but that possibly do not impact on Whaddon that much) WPC submitted a 'No Objection' response.

A final decision on both applications is still awaited.

## 22/01293/APP - Erection of two semi-detached cottages - Land R/O The Lowndes Arms Public House, 4 High Street, Whaddon.

Nothing further has appeared on the BC planning website since 13th July. A final decision is still awaited.

## 22/03410/APP - Householder application for proposed carport - 33A Stock Lane, Whaddon.

This is a re-application for a double open carport at the front of the existing property. The previous application was refused, and this one seeks to overcome the original BC objections having regard to a new detailed tree survey, and a planning statement which together explain the slightly changed position and simpler design. WPC has, on balance, submitted a 'No Objection' response but suggesting possible conditions, but the final decision will be down to BC, based on 'development principle' grounds.

A final decision is still awaited.

### FINAL NOTE TO ANY BUDDING 'SELF BUILDERS'

If you have ever thought about building your own home, and where to start, you might consider - for just £25 - registering your interest, with Bucks Council, who by law must keep a register and help satisfy this popular demand. Under their new Unitary status, they are looking to have one register for the whole of Bucks. Once registered, they will endeavour to ensure that enough self-build plots are incorporated on 'large sites' to satisfy the county demand. For instance, plots for self-builders could be made available at Shenley Park, Whaddon, thereby, trying to match applicants with sites. The concern is that if they do not have sufficient interest or applicants, they may not include self-build plots on these larger sites!

### **HIGHWAYS UPDATES From Whaddon Parish Council.**

### A Tale of Lots of Badgering!!!

Residents can't have failed to notice lots of highway activities around the village. Here are the details:

**New Field Gate on Coddimoor Lane.** After well over two years of badgering by WPC the smart new field gate near the junction of Coddimoor Lane and Stock Lane is now complete and compliant with planning and safety requirements. This will allow the landowner to rent out the land for grazing and allow agricultural vehicles to manoeuvre safely in and out the field, minimising obstruction and danger to other traffic.

Clearance of Drainage Ditches near Stock Lane/Ladymead Junction. Along with the above field gate works, and after well over two years of badgering, drainage ditches to carry away the surface water have been cleared all the way from the allotments along the field boundary to the culvert under the road, the pipes have been jetted, and Whaddon's own 'Lake Superior' by the Ladymead traffic calming buildout is now clearing a lot faster in times of heavy rain. There is still more to do to do on ditches running north of Stock Lane through the woodland, to ensure proper drainage continues, and lots of badgering is on-going, but a big improvement has been achieved.

New Double Yellow Lines on the Stock Lane/High St/Nash Rd Junction. Following many recent examples of illegal and highly dangerous parking around the Village Green area, including illegal blocking of pavements for pedestrians, pushchairs and wheelchairs, and following advice that the placement of lines confirms with the Highway Code so a village consultation is not necessary, WPC has secured funding from the Winslow & Villages Community Board for yellow no-parking lines. Badgering the police to enforce illegal parking regulations didn't work, so this is BC's and WPC's response to mitigate this dangerous problem. This work should be complete by end of March 2023 and should comply with and help enforce Highway Code regulations and improve safety. WPC would like to thank Bucks Council, and particularly the Winslow and Villages Community Board for their support and generous funding.

**Repairs to Stratford Rd Traffic Calming.** After more badgering by WPC, highways attended to remove the debris and make the electrical cables safe after an RTA. We're told replacement of the bollards is on the list, but we should not expect anything to happen for a few months at least. Safety signs are now in place. We will be badgering....

Repairs to High St Pavements. WPC has been badgering highways for funding to upgrade the High St pavements for well over ten years; promises have been broken many times due to lack of Bucks Council budget. In the last few weeks renewed efforts have been made to highlight the worsening condition of the pavements and we're hoping for a list of repairs to take place once BC has completed their promised 'Walk Around' and inspection following WPC's most recent badgering... with photos! We're looking for alternative ways of funding a proper upgrade and will carry on badgering....

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
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
