PARISH COUNCIL REPORT SPRING 2016

IT IS very pleasing to be able to say that we now have a Recreation Ground with modern and interesting children's playground equipment, which was opened at the end of November by the Chairman of AVDC, Jenny Bloom. Despite being cold, the weather could have been a lot worse, and the refreshments were most welcome. We shall always be indebted not only to Pat Haig for spearheading our grant application to WREN for this, but to the many other residents who gave their time and effort towards ensuring that all came to fruition.

The Parish Council met in January and precepted for an unchanged sum of £15,000 to carry out its work in the village.

Planned development is very much in focus at the moment as Milton Keynes Council has reached the stage in "Plan MK" where it is consulting on the preferred options for site allocations. MKC officers are coming to Whaddon Jubilee Hall on the evening of 23rd March to explain and to listen, in regard to Whaddon and Nash.

The Parish Council will also comment on the emerging Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan when it reaches the same stage later this year.

Many of you will be aware of the big part that Whaddon played in the winning of the Second World War, especially the sending of top secret messages to our top Commanders in the field from the two huts that were on Windy Ridge, aka Church Hill. There have been suggestions that this should have a permanent memorial and discussions are taking place as to what may, or may not, be possible.

The Parish Council owns three pieces of property in Whaddon: the Recreation Ground, the Allotments Ground and Constable's Plot, the field on Stratford Road whose rent used to pay the wages of the village bobby in days gone by. We decided that we should register title to these three pieces of ground and take advice on how we should manage our property going forward, and that is currently in progress. Almost finally, I cannot ever sufficiently thank Pat Haig for all the hard work she has done for many years for the Parish Council and I wish her and Alastair every happiness in Northampton. This means that, as nobody has demanded an Election, we shall be able to co-opt a suitable candidate, probably at the next Parish Council meeting on 31st March 2016 at 7.30pm at the Chapel. Do come along.

Lastly, I am delighted to welcome John Mortimer, as the new editor of Whaddon Quarterly, succeeding Pat Haig. It is an extraordinary coincidence that he once worked with Peter Spooner who lived in the village for many years, and was involved in the production of the first ever edition.

FROM THE EDITOR'S CHAIR

FOLLOWING Pat Haig's move to Northampton, I have taken over the editor's chair for a while. We all owe Pat a huge debt of gratitude for so skilfully editing the *Whaddon Quarterly* for nearly three years. I hope I can maintain her standards.

By an extraordinary twist of fate, I find myself editing this delightful publication, launched by Doug Stewart in winter 1981 "to keep you informed", but also edited for some 15 years by Peter Spooner. Many will recall Peter's epic *Millennium Souvenir Edition*. Peter and I were editors in the same publishing company in Woolwich, in south-east London in the early 1970s. We knew each another well, and were in close touch following the sinking of *MS Herald of Free Enterprise*. The cross-channel Ro-Ro ferry capsized on 6 March 1987 resulting in 193 passengers (including Peter's son, Martin) and crew losing their lives. I attended Peter's funeral in 2008.

Following an apprenticeship in the aero engine industry and attendance at Cranfield University, I have been in publishing over 50 years, first as editor, then publishing director of *The Engineer* – founded 160 years ago and still going strong. Later, as managing director, I ran an international book and journal publishing company in Kempston before launching my newsletter and book publishing business in Toddington in the early 1980s. Following its sale, I maintain an automotive industry blog and have written several books, including a novel and a biography.

Since the last issue of the Quarterly, the village has, for many weeks, assumed an

air of tranquillity as work by Western Power Distribution led to closure of the Stratford Road. The closure – the laying of 33,000kVA cables took longer than first expected due to record December rainfall – caused huge disruption, inconvenience and additional costs for many. At the same time, however, it introduced a feeling of tranquillity, reminiscent of quiet, traffic-free days of 50 years ago. Road traffic is essential to modern society but can cause problems, as incidents in 2014 of the



overturned cement mixer (right) and a school bus engine fire demonstrated. There is a legal 30mph speed limit; it is there for a reason – to safeguard life and property.

November saw the opening of the revamped recreation ground; a huge vote of thanks is due to Pat's driving energy and the hard work of many village stalwarts.

On my dog walks I notice a fine, new seat (*In loving memory of Henry Adams, 1928-2015*) outside the west door of the church. It will give young and old a chance to sit and enjoy fine weather – when it comes.

Meanwhile, I will try "to keep you informed" and ease the passage for others to make their contributions. My thanks also to Marianna for her invaluable help.

Whaddon's future: Too important to ignore

Government is applying pressure on local councils, like Aylesbury Vale and Milton Keynes, to build more houses with implications for the countryside and Whaddon's Local Landscape Area, as Graham Stewart explains.

Whaddon Village has existed for hundreds of years, and during this time has changed little, certainly in comparison to what might be on the cards now!

We enter a period of change, brought about by the country's growth and the need for many more homes and employment requirements, which will impact, not just on the readers of this article, but by almost everyone, everywhere, as all local authorities look to accommodate this unprecedented growth being demanded by Government.

In response, Aylesbury Vale District Council and Milton Keynes Council are in the process of producing new Local Plans. These will look at ways of accommodating this growth and Whaddon, sitting in the relatively unconstrained northern part of the Aylesbury district, but almost immediately adjoining one of the country's most successful and certain-to-expand 'New Towns', Milton Keynes, will be affected.

Whaddon will come under the planning microscope of those making important strategic growth and expansion decisions at both district and county council levels.

As these various plans look ahead some 20 to 50 years, some may not be interested in what happens, and sadly, may not be around to witness it. But others, perhaps the younger generation, or those yet to move into our village, might, and probably will, witness changes that would have been unthinkable 50 years ago, before the onset of Milton Keynes, or 100 years ago, before the great wars that shaped our country thereafter.

Most of us have witnessed the growth of MK on our doorstep and, whatever you may think about that, it has been exciting, bringing with it great opportunities as well as disappointments.

Most of you will have enjoyed shopping experiences, trips to the theatre, cinema and the many new restaurants, cycling along the Redway system and relaxing in one of the wonderful landscaped parks, so well maintained by the Parks Trust. Recently, I even enjoyed sky diving, as I hovered in an upward torrent of air at Airkix MK! Others will shudder at the loss of irreplaceable countryside that has made way for these pleasures and the loss of personal amenities as HGV's, (including last year's overturned Hanson cement truck), and extra traffic trundle through our village, affecting our safety and rural way of life.

Whatever your position or thinking, Whaddon is now under threat like never before in its history. Apart, that is, from 50 years ago, when it was almost included in the original plans for Milton Keynes.

At that time, farmers put together a strong case for saving valuable farmland, and Government Inspectors of the day saw and recognised the beauty and importance of protecting the Whaddon Valley landscape. Inspectors even redrew the boundaries back to almost what we have today (excluding the current Western Expansion Area, which formed part of the last review of the MK Plan some 10 years ago, together with a similar-sized area in the east of the city).

So why is this important – even if it is something you know already?

Well, your Parish Council having recently responded to two public consultations (Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan and MK Site Allocations Plan), must now turn their attention to the latest, and probably most important, consultation so far.

Plan: MK 'Strategic Development Directions' is the latest stage of the new Plan for Milton Keynes. And, like those farmers of 50 years ago, or those residents within the village who successfully fought the 'Shenley Ridge battle' just over 10 years ago, you can now have your say.

It is important that you do so, particularly if you want to help shape or influence Whaddon's destiny, or simply comment on how and where you think Milton Keynes should expand in the future. Without wishing to worry or upset any residents, there are now plans in the public arena for all to see, where huge housing and employment developments, albeit with large swathes of extended parkland, threaten to encroach, and could be built very close to the village.

These possible development areas include Bottlehouse Farm behind Briary View, farmland behind our recently and greatly-improved recreation ground and, once again, large areas of the Local Landscape Area in the Whaddon Valley beyond Whaddon Hall, alongside Oakhill Wood and around Shenley Dens Farm.

Some might argue that Whaddon is fortunate to a degree, as Newton Longville is threatened by similar developer-led plans that could completely surround and engulf it. There are new roads planned to relieve congestion and help the flow of East and West traffic being considered, along with the much-promised Oxford to Cambridge rail link that, although currently delayed, is, I am told, going to happen in the reasonably near future.

These various plans are up for grabs and still in the air, as are alternative options which include extending Milton Keynes to the east of the M1 Motorway, building new satellite settlements in the MK rural area, or intensifying, rebuilding and regenerating the existing MK urban area.

However, local authorities want to know what <u>you</u> think should happen, where this required development should go, and whether it should be one of the options, a combination of several, or none of them!

On the following page, I try to explain as simply as possible, what is happening and how you can become involved, should you wish. If you choose not to, I will fully understand; it is sometimes not easy to grasp the detail, nor is it a quick job to do so, but as a Parish Councillor who has always lived in the area and has some knowledge of what is a very complicated subject, I would not be doing right by you to simply ignore the challenges that face us all.

PLAN:MK' – PUBLIC MEETING – 23 MARCH

WHAT IS PLAN:MK?

This new plan will replace the 2013 MK Core Strategy and will determine how much new development is needed, and where it should go, until 2035. Growth will continue beyond 2035, and because MK is 50 years old in 2017 a separate commission is looking at the next 50 years. The results will feed into the Plan:MK process. The Plan:MK contains four main strategic growth options **upon which your views are sought**.

Option 1 (see much simplified drawing on next page) if implemented in full, would have a massive impact on Whaddon. It proposes MK growth that would spill over the Shenley Ridge, cross the Stratford Road and extend almost to Beachampton, whilst also running behind the village into Bottlehouse Farm, behind Briary View and continuing behind the village playing field down to Bottledump roundabout on the A421, and then onto and around Newton Longville.

The other three strategic options are: East of the M1 Motorway, Satellite settlements built around existing MK villages and intensification/redevelopment in the existing MK urban area. The final choice could be one option, or a combination of two or three options.

WHEN WILL THIS HAPPEN?

The consultation is already well under way, and **comments must be made to M.K. Council by 6 April**. Look at the document and the four important 'strategic proposal maps' by simply Googling: Plan:MK - Milton Keynes Council, and open the link on page one to : Plan:MK, 'Strategic Development Directions Consultation Document'.

IMPORTANT VILLAGE MEETING

Because this consultation is **so important to Whaddon residents**, your Parish Council has arranged with MK Council a 'Drop In' exhibition at the Whaddon Jubilee Hall between **6.00pm and 9.00pm on Wednesday 23 March**.

It is hoped that all residents will attend, as there will be displays showing plans of all four strategic options, and MK planning officers will give two brief presentations (at 6.30pm and 8.00pm), and will answer any questions.

As Nash and Beachampton will be invited to attend, your Parish Council will be on hand to record all visitors and hopefully to help you make your response before the 6th April deadline (i.e. two weeks after the event).

A special Parish Council meeting will be held on 31 March to review the outcome of the exhibition, and to finalise the 'Parish' response. As with all W.P.C. meetings residents are welcome, and encouraged, to attend.

WHAT CAN, OR SHOULD I DO?


Firstly: Look at the Plan:MK document (as above), **or** inspect it and the display (but please do not remove it!) **that has been put up** in the Whaddon Jubilee Hall.

Secondly: Attend one of the two presentations **on Wednesday 23 March (6.30pm and 8.00)**. Please come early and view the exhibition boards before your chosen presentation time.

Have your questions ready for the Q&A sessions that will follow the presentations.

Finally: Make your comments known to MKC **before 6 April**. Details of how to do so will be provided at the village meeting on 23 March, by MKC or your Parish Council. Your Parish Council will try to keep you updated on the village notice boards or through the village email service. Planning applications that have been or are being considered since the last Quarterly publication, include these listed below:

15/04261/APP. Whaddon Jubilee Hall. Single storey front/side and rear extensions, access ramp up to new entrance doors.

The trustees of Whaddon Jubilee Hall have submitted a planning application to AVDC and their decision is awaited. Your Parish Council support the application. **The proposed extension plans will be on display in the village hall during the evening of 23 March**, when it is hoped that residents will be attending the Plan:MK 'Drop In' session (between 6.00pm and 9.00pm)

15/00716/APP. Two new detached houses and car parking - Land rear of 2a and 2b High Street.

After several weeks of consideration, the Planning Inspector has recommended that the appeal by Corran Wakefield against AVDC's refusal decision for two large detached houses should be dismissed. This decision justifies the strong objections made by your Parish Council. The main reasons for refusal were: lack of parking leading to safety concerns for those using the track and Stock Lane; cramped appearance, which would be harmful to the character and appearance of the area, and lack of evidence showing that the protected walnut tree can be safeguarded. Unfortunately, the Inspector found no evidence to overturn the BCC highway and vision splay acceptance. The full dismissal reasons can be found on the AVDC Planning web site under reference No: **15/00716/APP**

15/03803/APP. Removal of hedge on west boundary and replace with a close boarded fence with a pedestrian access gate. Fine View, Whaddon Hall, High Street.

AVDC have yet to make their decision.

15/03799/APP. Change of use of agricultural land with existing hard standing area to residential parking and erection of front gate (part retrospective) - The Cottage, Kennel Lane.

AVDC have yet to make their decision.

15/02883/APP. Removal of existing conservatory. Erection of two storey side and single storey rear extensions with roof light - 33A Stock Lane.

Application approved with conditions.

15/02701/APP. Erection of a single storey winter/summer house - 15 High Street.

Application approved.

Jubilee Hall Improvements

SINCE March last year, the Jubilee Hall Committee has been working with its architects planning major improvements. The plan was submitted for planning approval to Aylesbury Vale District Council towards the end of last year, and a decision is anticipated in the next few weeks.

We are hopeful that consent will be granted and are grateful for the support for the proposals by the Parish Council.

The main benefits of the plan are as follows:

- To provide a separate access, entrance hall and toilets, including a disabled one, to enable the smaller room of the hall to be used independently when required.
- To construct an improved kitchen to the rear of the building and to fit this out so it is suitable for food preparation and cooking.
- To build additional, much needed storage facilities at the rear of the site.
- To redecorate the main hall.

The Jubilee Hall is heavily used at present and the new layout will enable activities to be held in the small room at the same time as the main hall is being used.

These improvements will widen the scope of events which can be held for the benefit of the village, and having a catering kitchen will be important, as the present one does not conform to statutory requirements.

Copies of the plan will be available for inspection and comment at the Jubilee Hall on March 23rd, at the same time as the Milton Keynes Plan consultation. We hope as many of you as possible will drop in and provide us with your comments.

The Jubilee Hall Committee has worked hard to raise funds but we will need to apply for additional grant aid. Villagers' support will be important in order for this to happen, so please sign one of the forms on 23rd when you come.

Whaddon Recreation Ground Reopens for Play

Way back at the end of November, the weather was blustery and cold but spirits were high when our Parish Council held the official re-opening of its newly-refurbished recreation ground, following a £47,000 donation from WREN, a not-for-profit business, which awards grants to community, environmental and heritage projects across the UK from funds donated to the Landfill Communities Fund. Whaddon villagers turned out in their droves to support the opening, despite the inclement weather, and warmed up with tea, coffee and mulled wine.

Civic dignitaries from both Aylesbury Vale and Milton Keynes Councils came together to show



support for the project, as the Mayor of Buckingham, Andy Mahi, Chair of Aylesbury Vale District Council, Jenny Bloom and Deputy Mayor and Mayoress of Milton Keynes, Steve Coventry and Liane Lacey, and local AVDC councillor John Chilver, all helped young village resident Casper to cut the official ribbon.

Casper was the catalyst for the playground project when he wrote to the Parish Council saying that he thought that the play area was in

dire need of refurbishment. He is very pleased with the result.

The grant has been used to install an imaginative play area for all ages, with equipment from swings, seesaw and an adventure playground, to an outdoor three-person multi-gym, which includes a cross trainer, step- and rowing machine for the over 15s. For the less active, new bench seating has also been installed.

Whaddon Parish Councillor, Pat Haig, said, "It is fantastic that WREN can make funds like this available to communities and we are very pleased with the outcome of our project, which is not only for the young children of the area, but also for teenagers and adults. We see this as the first of many developments for

the recreation ground and hope to start a community gardening area in the spring of next year. The recreation ground is now up and running and we look forward to seeing children of all ages taking advantage of the wonderful new facilities."

ground has a super new sign, generously donated by the Whaddon Women's Institute in recognition of its 80th anniversary. Thanks to Stuart Grace for installing it on site, along with a brand new litter bin, purchased by the Parish Council.







On January 20th we started our **Hands up for Jesus** after-school club in Whaddon School.



Fraudsters regularly hack into personal online accounts to obtain details which will allow them to defraud you.

To prevent fraudsters, it's very important to use strong passwords when setting up and accessing online accounts and online banking.

Passwords should be memorable enough not to have to write them

down and long enough to be unique and hard to guess, which will ensure they are less vulnerable to being stolen.

If it is not possible to remember passwords a password manager could be used to store them securely.

Protect yourself:

• Make sure passwords are memorable so that you don't have to write them down. Make sure they are unique.

• Th!nk about how you could change the l3tters in your n0rmal passw0rds to make them more difficult to gue55!


• Use long, non-dictionary words and use different ones for each of your personal accounts and online banking. Make sure you change them regularly.

• Make sure passwords are not stored on devices that have shared access by other people, for example in internet cafes and when using other public Wi-Fi.



When and where do we look for Jesus? Perhaps at times that suit us, in the history books, or for reassurance in times of crisis?

On the first Easter, Jesus' followers went to a tomb to look for him. Many had seen Jesus crucified, die and laid in a tomb just days before. But as they were looking, they were met by a messenger who told them ... 'He is not here. He is risen!'. They were the first to know the truth: Jesus was not among the dead, but the living! And so what?!

What does this mean to us?

We are now looking forward to 2016 when, in May, we celebrate our eighteenth birthday. We are planning a social event to mark the occasion.



Doug Lowe 1931 – 2015

DOUG LOWE was born in Winslow in October 1931 but moved with his parents to Barn Hill Farm in the early 1940s. On arrival in Whaddon, he attended the village school (he and Evelyn in the village travelled by bus to a school in Stony Stratford for a time during the war) until he reached 15, when he began work on the farm.

Although he lived for a few years in Great Horwood after his first marriage, Barn Hill Farm was always home, and where he worked. His heart was there too, and how appropriate perhaps that it was on the farm that he chose to be buried when, as he put it, his time came. This required special permission and took a little while to arrange.

In addition to farming livestock for all his working life, which lasted until just 15 months before he died, Doug also enjoyed clay pigeon shooting. He held regular shoots on the farm and joined others in the locality. The Boxing Day shoot with local farmers against a team nominally from the Lowndes Arm pub, proved to become a fixture that became firmly stamped in the village calendar. This is set to continue as a charity memorial shoot in memory of Doug.

Doug also played for the village cricket club and, in later years, served for a time as the club's chairman. Cricket was a hobby in which he continued to show a great interest for the whole of his life.

Doug was for many years a regular at the Lowndes Arms. Every Sunday, without fail – with the exception of lambing time and Wednesdays in winter months when it was too dark for clay pigeon shooting – he met with many of his mates from the village and beyond. The 'farmer's nights' became something of an institution as games of 'spoof' and dominoes formed a regular part of the evenings' entertainment. So too were the numerous conversations, jokes and general banter that added to village life.

Over the course of countless years, and at the centre of various parts of village life, Doug gained the reputation among his peers, and the younger generation, of being one of the 'good old boys'. A reputation that no doubt explained why the village church brimmed to capacity on 20th January, in a service to honour his life. On that day, his family, as well as the farming and village community, bid a fond farewell to an old friend and colleague who had given, and added, so much to its fabric.

Advent



Last Thursday there was another exciting delivery, five balance bikes were delivered.




They needed to be put together. The children watched as the teachers made one and they asked great questions.

How to keep safe and advice on home security from your local council

On average just 1.5 houses in the Vale are burgled per day. Nevertheless many burglaries could have been prevented by considering these principles:

- Lock your doors and windows regardless of if you are in the property or not. The point of entry in more than 75% of the time is through a door or window.
- Lock your UPVC doors with the key. Flipping the handle is not enough to secure your door.
- Keep valuable items out of view. Leaving a laptop on view is an open invitation for a thief. Even less valuable items can be used to gain entry and is the most common way to force entry.
- Property mark your valuables with ultra-violet marking kits or Smartwater (contact us to receive a free UV pen). When goods are marked it enables recovered property to be returned and improves the chance of conviction.
- The security of the rear of the home is integral. Many burglaries are carried out via entry of a back door or window so make sure your back doors and windows are locked and invest in some prickly plants for your fence boundaries. If you have a side gate leading to your garden make sure it is locked.
- Make sure your shed/garage is locked and secure.

Don't give thieves the tools to enter your home.

• User timer switches.

In the winter months when it's dark and nobody is at home a timer switch can be set to activate a lamp on the landing or hallway giving the impression that someone is at home. Timer switches are also ideal for when you're on holiday. You can buy these for under £3 from hardware stores.

Additional security advice for outbuildings and your garden

- Replace ordinary screws on outbuilding doors with non-return screws or coach bolts (the latter have smooth heads that cannot be undone with a screwdriver or spanner).
- Secure up-and-over garage doors with padlocks through the inside runners, or fit a
 padlock (with hasp and staple) on either side of the door.
- Add a mortise deadlock to existing latches on double wooden doors and fit strong bolts to the top and bottom of the adjoining door.
- Investing in a household alarm is a great deterant for burglars.
- Thorny shrubs growing under windows or against access routes such as drainpipes, walls and fences create an effective natural barrier. Berberis, blackthorn, rubus and pyracantha are all good for this. They are easy to grow and readily available from your garden centre.
- Fix a grill to steel plates inside garage and shed windows. Chicken wire is a good low cost alternative and may slow a thief down.
- Keep your home in good condition. Burglars looking for an easy way in will target split, rotten or warped doors and window frames.
- Put away tools and equipment and lock sheds and outbuildings when you're not using them.
- If you have been a victim of a burglary or are over 60, you can receive some security improvements for free.

Creatíve Coach: thoughts from my comfy chaír

That's enough! What's your tipping point? What does it take for you to think, "I've finally had

enough of feeling/being/doing [*insert appropriate describing word here*] and I'm going to do something about it." Then what? Where do you start?

I'd say start with talking to someone. (Well I guess I would, since that's my area of expertise.) So you *could* start with talking to yourself. Come on, we all do it, including you! So, here are some questions, tips, hints to begin with, to get you back on track.

What do I want?

Ask yourself this, and always write down your answers in the positive. Not: "I want to stop feeling scared/like I don't know who I am any more/that I don't deserve xyz"; instead: "I want to feel confident, I want to have a clear direction, I want a structure to my life", or whatever it is you feel you're lacking.

What's my purpose?

What's important to you? Resilient, confident people know what they're about. They have a clear idea of their values, beliefs and how they want to use them. Start with a list of positive words that describe you, on a good day. If you really struggle with this, try imagining what your best friend would say about you on a good day.

Which area of my life do I want to concentrate on now?

Maybe it's work that's causing you the most stress. Perhaps it's family-focused: a child leaving home and the gap that leaves in your life, elderly parents becoming increasingly frail and needing more of your time and attention, your health, your partner's health. What's your priority right now?

What's my plan?

As well as a purpose, everyone needs a plan. Without an idea of what to do next, or where you want to end up eventually, energy levels and motivation drop and everything seems a struggle. It's not always necessary to have a huge goal. Make it realistic for yourself, with just a little challenge attached. Plan out the first step to take, and then the next one. Or make it big and dramatic: the choice is yours. The end goal is important, but more important is the first small step towards it.

What might get in my way?

It's always good to have back-up. *When life throws you lemons, make lemonade*, as the saying goes. Plan for the occasional "what if..." and plan how to get around, over or under the barriers you might come across, including those you create for yourself.

Who and what do I need?

This is not a time for excuses. If you really want to change, you'll need a "team" to help. Even if it's a team of 1 other person you can call on when you really need support. There will be someone. What else might you need to keep you on track? An app on your phone? A particularly helpful book to read? A beautiful (or plain) notebook and pen to record your progress?

When shall I start?

How about right now? If that's simply not possible, give yourself a date. It's important to have a start time/date, otherwise you could simply put it off forever.

If you need more help, you know where I am.

You could record memories of loved ones from the Great War, as this clipping from page 7 of *The Daily Mirror* of April 4, 1917 proclaims:



Stanley Pitkin.

BROTHERS KILLED AT FRONT. "Mrs. Pitkin (Evelyn's great grandmother) of Whaddon, near Bletchley, has lost her three sons within a brief period. Stanley, who came all the way from New Zealand, was seriously wounded and died at sea on the way to England. (Evelyn adds that Stanley immigrated before the start of WW1 to New Zealand where he decided to join up following the outbreak of war.) The newspaper's banner headline that day extolled: "America at war with Germany - President Wilson says 'We are about to accept the gage of battle....with this natural foe to liberty". The paper added that President Wilson's speech 'will live in history'. The three sons lost in the First World War were Evelyn's great uncles.

A little while ago the North Bucks Branch of the Oxford Diocesan Guild conducted a survey around the bell towers in the branch to check on the condition of the bells, ropes and the number and age of the ringers.

The report we had back regarding Whaddon had some very worrying points - the condition of the bells and the tower was very good, the ropes poor (but we have had them renewed) - but the most worrying point raised was the number and age of the ringers! We now have an average age with our youngest ringer present of over 65 and without him 70. Realistically we know we have a ringing span of about 2 years left and unless we have some younger people joining us we will have to join Thornborough, Beachampton and Great Horwood with a silent bell tower.

Tribute to the past

IS the past important? Or should we focus on the present and the future? Now there's a question.

Certainly, it is widely held that nearby Bletchley Park played a crucial part in the Second World War. The role of men and women breaking codes of German Enigma machines is well documented. It is less widely known that in many respects Bletchley Park could not have completed its work without

the additional work at Whaddon Hall and the transmitters at 'Windy Ridge' close to St Mary's Church.

Finally, after over 70 years, the brave people who worked in the Whaddon area during the war are to be recognised. The tribute, approved by Bletchley Park Trust, is an external display similar to the one shown above. The final location is yet to be decided.

The Tribute tells the story of MI6 Communications (Section VIII) 1939-1946 which, from its Whaddon Hall headquarters and 'Windy Ridge', disseminated most of the ULTRA messages to military commanders in the field, embassies and covert agents.

The Tribute will:

• explain that before 'Q' created gadgets for James Bond, Whaddon Hall and its 300-strong team of specialists developed innovative spy and covert equipment, such as an agent's MkVII attaché case with a built-in wireless set.

• reveal how the first 'black' propaganda programmes transmitted into Germany and Italy were recorded in a studio in Whaddon Hall.

• outline the Whaddon Hall team's development of 'Ascension' for direct wireless contact with agents from aircraft flying from the Little Horwood airfield that opened in 1942.

• demonstrate that motor torpedo boats (MTBs) were equipped with wireless equipment to carry messages across the channel and help ferry home escaped POW's and pilots.



• disclose how ambulances, stripped of stretchers, were fitted with wireless equipment for the American sector's invasion of Europe.

Geoffrey Pidgeon (seen here left leaning out of the right-hand truck during preparations for D-Day 1944 at Whaddon Hall), a wartime member of MI6 based at Whaddon, and I have worked behind the scenes to establish the Tribute.

The Tribute will be paid for by private donations. Geoffrey and I believe it should be funded by a 'Village Collective' and those listed on the Tribute,

MI6 Section VIII veterans, their descendants and friends of Whaddon from around the world. We aim to raise £5,000 for the Tribute and 'Reflective Garden'. Maximum donation each will be £250.

We also aim to publish a book '*Whaddon Tribute to MI6 Communications'* with excerpts from '*The Secret Wireless War'* and images from the Tribute's unveiling ceremony. All those donating from £10 will be listed in the book; their comments limited to 12 words.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH REPORT WHADDON



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Residents in Aylesbury Vale are being urged by THAMES VALLEY POLICE to look out for any suspicious activity following a number of burglaries and thefts.

Police officers are investigating after homes were burgled and tools and machinery were taken from works vans, vehicles and outbuildings.

Most recently rural communities in the east and south of Aylesbury Vale have been affected including Great Bricknell, Stewkley, Soulbury, Wing, Newton Longville and Ivinghoe, Buckingham and Wendover.

Officers are now urging residents to review their home, outbuilding and vehicle security and keep an eye out for any unusual vehicles or activity.

If you see anything you're not happy with, perhaps a van or vehicle you don't recognise, or anything suspicious, make a note of the vehicle registration and description of the occupants and call police on 101. If you believe there is a crime in progress dial 999.

Crime prevention advice

- Invest in a timer light switch and vary the time it comes on each day to make it look more natural. It can also be used with a radio or TV to give the impression that someone's home.
- Purchase a fake/simulated TV device which lights up a room like a real TV.
- Keep valuables out of sight and mark them with your house number and postcode using a UV pen.
- Lock your doors and windows. If you have a UPVC door make sure you have double-locked it by lifting the handle and locking it with the key. Make sure the key is removed from the lock and out of reach.
- Lock tools away in a secure building or part of a building when not in use.
- Do not leave a garage or garden shed unlocked, especially if it has a connecting door to the house.
- Fit strong padlocks and hardware to shed and garage doors.
- Make sure that the doors are solid enough not to be kicked in.
- Fit locks or bars to windows.
- Lock ladders inside your garage or shed.
- Secure your wheelie bin to stop an intruder using it to climb on.
- Consider lockable steel boxes or anchor posts fitted to the floor of vans or sheds to secure tools and equipment.
- Install a battery or mains-powered shed alarm, available from all good DIY stores at a reasonable price.
- For extra security, replace the screws in external hinges of your shed or garage side-door with 'clutch-head' screws (also known as 'anti-tamper' or 'coffin' screws).
- Tools should be uniquely marked, photographed and recorded.
- Register tools on the national database <u>Immoblise</u>. Include your postcode and property name or number.
- Consider 'postcoding' and marking tools and equipment using the premise postcode and house number or first three letters of the property name.
- Use property marking to uniquely mark tools. Popular options include overt visible permanent marking (painting or CRE-mark), or UV marking and DNA products.

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


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
